# Executive Summary

In 2023, Siaya Muungano Network (SIMUN) made remarkable strides in its mission to uplift adolescent girls, women, and youth in Siaya County, Kenya. Despite facing significant challenges such as shrinking civic space and economic hardships, SIMUN remained resilient and impactful. The organization successfully rolled out seven major projects that centered on sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR), climate action, economic empowerment, and the inclusion of persons with disabilities. These efforts not only expanded SIMUN's reach and visibility but also catalyzed organizational growth, marked by a strategic transition to a new office space and securing vital funding from the French Embassy to advance initiatives in SRHR and economic empowerment.

Among the standout projects were "Power to Youth," "Women Voices in Climate Action," and the "Adolescent Girls Power Program," each playing a critical role in driving SIMUN's advocacy and empowerment agenda. The organization's influence extended beyond local boundaries as it actively participated in national and international forums, including the Africa Climate Summit and COP28, contributing significantly to policy frameworks like the Siaya County Youth Development Policy. These achievements were underpinned by robust strategies that included deep community mobilization, targeted grassroots engagement, strategic advocacy, and forming partnerships that enhanced financial management, donor relations, and staff development.

SIMUN's work was meticulously aligned with Sustainable Development Goals 3, 5, 8, 10, and 13, reflecting a commitment to improving health services, promoting gender equality, fostering inclusive economic growth, reducing inequalities, and addressing climate action. However, the journey was not without its hurdles. The organization navigated the complexities of limited civic space and economic constraints, which posed significant challenges to community outreach and engagement. Yet, SIMUN's determination to foster positive change remained unwavering.

Looking ahead to 2024, SIMUN is poised to deepen its impact by strengthening resource mobilization efforts, expanding strategic partnerships, and refining its community engagement models. The organization will place a strong emphasis on leadership mentorship for young women, promote gender-transformative approaches through male involvement, and fully develop AGWs safe spaces into SRHR academies, offering comprehensive learning and life skills training. Additionally, SIMUN is committed to enhancing its governance and institutional capacity, bolstering knowledge management, and establishing psychological safety as a cornerstone of staff well-being. In the face of ongoing challenges, SIMUN's resolve to build a just society where adolescent girls, women, and youth can live with dignity, enjoy equal rights, and actively shape their communities remains as strong as ever.

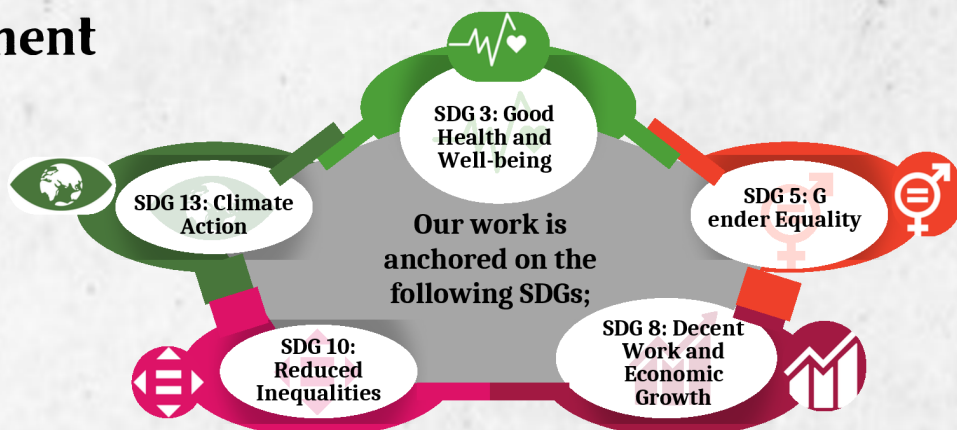

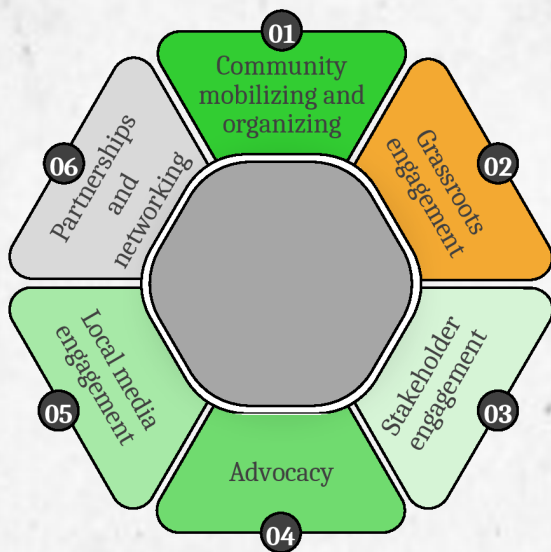

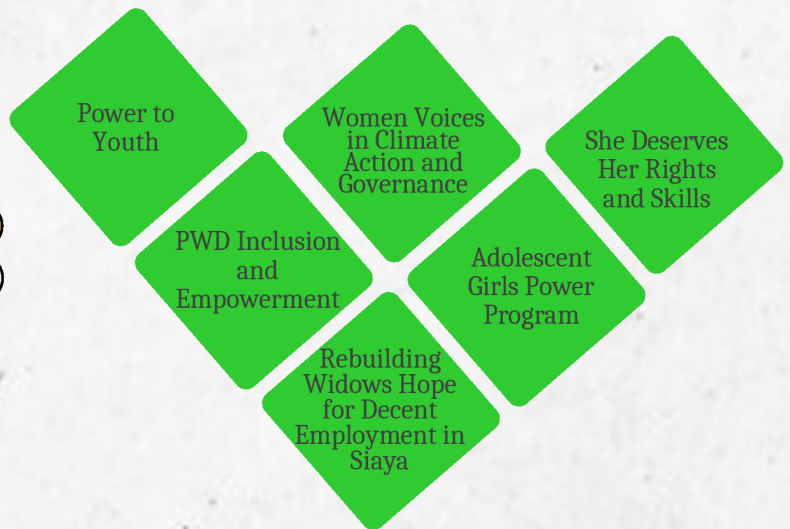

# OUR PROGRESS

## Power to Youth



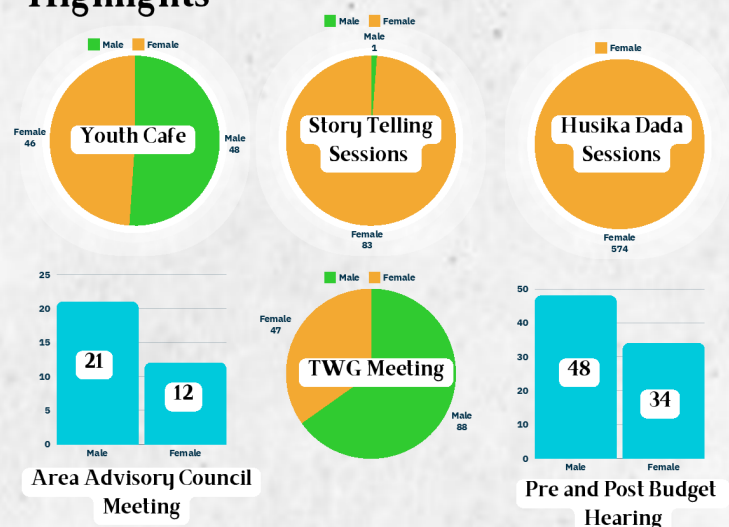
The Power to Youth project is a 5-year project that aims to empower and create space for Adolescent Girls and Young Women and Youth from underserved communities to be able to make informed choices, enjoy their rights free from harmful practices and have violence free societies.

Under the project, we continued to champion for the sexual reproductive health rights of adolescent girls and young people in Siaya and their right to meaningful participation in development processes including youth engagement in county government planning.

During the reporting period, we conducted 4 youth cafes to create strong youth agency for advocacy on GBV and unintended pregnancies reduction, 4 story telling sessions on promoting progressive social norms in communities in Siaya, 15 Husika Dada sessions to build more voice of AGYWs that challenge inequalities and reduction of SGBV cases from household to community level, 7 radio talk shows to generate community debates and promote support for AGYWs rights, convened 3 meetings for young people in Siaya for pre and post budget hearing on County

annual Development plan to analyze and develop recommendations around the County Annual Development plan for submission, , 5 Technical Working Group meetings and joined other stakeholders in marking 6 international days in Siaya. Under the project, we also supported the development of the Siaya county Youth development policy together with and other stakeholders, submitted a communique calling to action on the efforts and actions to prevent and respond to GBV in Siaya to the first lady, Siaya County, during the launch of the 16 days of activism in Siaya, and held one press statement to address issues of Governance in Siaya County

# Women Voices in Climate Action and Governance.



The project aims at strengthening the voices of women in Siaya to claim their rights, address inequalities and advocate for their inclusion in climate actions and environmental governance. During the period under review, we focused our advocacy efforts both at the county and national level. At the national level, we partnered with Lamu Women Alliance in Lamu, Community Advocacy and Awareness Trust in Nairobi, Women Empowerment Link in Homabay for joint advocacy towards promoting women participation and inclusion in climate action and decision making in the realization of climate justice. Together we developed two reports on gender analysis of climate change policies and legal frameworks in Kenya and gender assessment of FLLoCA as a financial mechanism to deliver locally led climate actions. The two reports informed our advocacy objectives for 2023 at the national level.

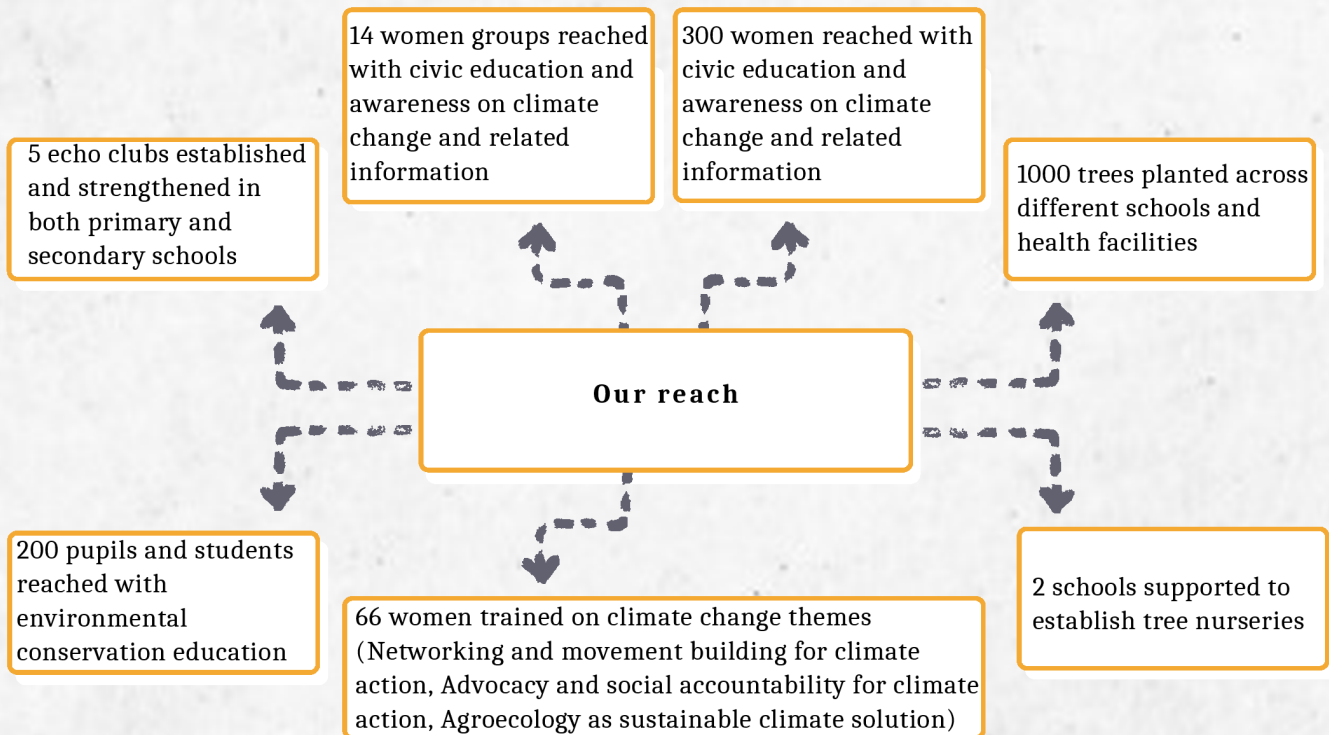
At the county level, we held consultative meetings with duty bearers and policy makers in Siaya for discussions on improving climate change governance in Siaya including gender inclusion in climate actions and contributed to the development of the Siaya County climate Change Action Plan for 2023-2028. To

strengthen the capacity of women in climate action, we supported 3 trainings for women champions advocacy and social accountability for climate action, networking and movement building and agro ecology as a sustainable agricultural practice. Through the trainings, the women acquired useful skills of advocating for sustainable climate solutions. We also continued to promote environmental conservation and climate adaptation initiatives through tree planting initiatives where we supported and strengthened five(5) Echo clubs in identified Schools in Siaya as platforms for engaging young people in schools to increase their awareness on environmentalism, environmental conservation and climate change reaching a total of 200 pupils and students in both primary and secondary schools

Our staff also took part in climate change discussions both at the national and International levels as spaces for advancing our work on climate justice i.e African climate summit and week held in Nairobi in September 2023 and the Conference of Parties(COP 28) held in Dubai in December 2023. At the African Climate week, we participated in a side event titled empowering Kenya and Africa: Unveiling the intersections of gender and climate change event hosted by our partner Community Advocacy and awareness Trust (Crawn Trust).



# Highlights



## Uchumi Huru Project



This project targets women small-scale traders in Alego Usonga Constituency, Siaya County, aiming to promote the realization of their economic rights. \*Uchimi Huru\* empowers these women by providing essential resources, training, and support to enhance their financial stability and business acumen. By addressing barriers such as limited access to capital and markets, the project fosters a more inclusive economic environment. Ultimately, \*Uchimi Huru\* strives to uplift women entrepreneurs, enabling them to achieve financial independence and contribute meaningfully to the local economy.





# Adolescent girls power program



In 2023, the Siaya Cluster, comprising the Siaya Muungano Network (SIMUN), Stawisha Africa Initiative (SAI), and the Siaya Young Women Alliance (SYWA), implemented impactful activities under the Adolescent Girl Power Program (AGPP). Our efforts focused on building strong relationships within the cluster, mapping and supporting adolescent mothers, and fostering sustainable community-led solutions.

We organized 7 cluster rotational meetings and 4 exchange and learning forums, which strengthened our partnerships and shared best practices in program management, safeguarding, and governance. This collaboration led to the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding, creating a robust framework for our long-term engagement and effective monitoring of the project.

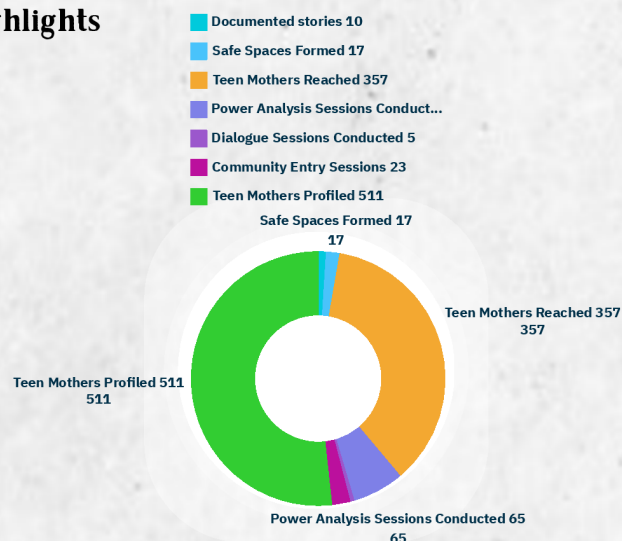
Our community mapping exercise reached 4,492 girls under 24 years across 2,262 households in Bar Agulu and Olwa sub-locations. This initiative identified critical gaps, such as educational vulnerabilities and health service access, which highlighted the need for targeted interventions (FINAL SIAYA CLUSTER TEC...). Through a series of power analysis sessions with 357 adolescent mothers, we deepened our understanding of the challenges they face and co-created sustainable solutions. The sessions fostered the formation of 13 cohorts, ensuring ongoing support and peer-to-peer

mentorship for these young mothers.

We established community referral pathways, enabling seamless access to healthcare, legal, and educational services. These pathways strengthened our visibility and partnerships at both the community and county levels. We also developed a database of 357 teen mothers, supporting future linkages and continuous engagement.

The Siaya Cluster's commitment to socio-economic empowerment for young mothers is reflected in our efforts to address extreme vulnerabilities and provide immediate, personalized support where needed. We also launched a powerful documentary that showcases the voices of adolescent mothers, advocating for long-term interventions to enhance their lives and those of their children.

# PWD Inclusion and Empowerment



The project is implemented under our Husika Dada model with the overall goal of empowering adolescent girls and young women by providing them with information on SRHR including menstrual hygiene and incorporating economic empowerment through training and linkages. During the period under review, we supported 2 trainings for adolescent girls and young women with disabilities; 20 AGYWs with disability were trained on SRHR advocacy and launched as champions of SRHR for persons with disability while 14 were trained on hands on skills in making jewelry and supported with the materials required to start their business. We also held information dissemination sessions to 40 AGYWs with disability providing them with information about menstrual hygiene management, reproductive health and GBV related issues. Mentorship sessions on life skills were also conducted with them creating a safe space for them to learn various issues that affect their lives. 40 AGYWs with disability targeted in the project received dignity kits to help them maintain their dignity during menstruation.

During the 2023 international Women's Day, we also supported them to showcase their products as a way of marketing their products.

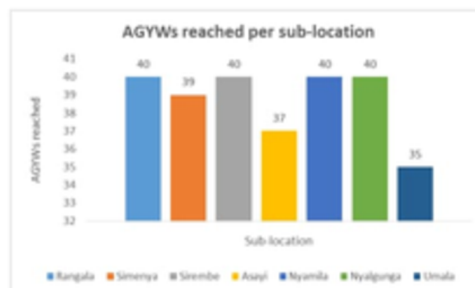
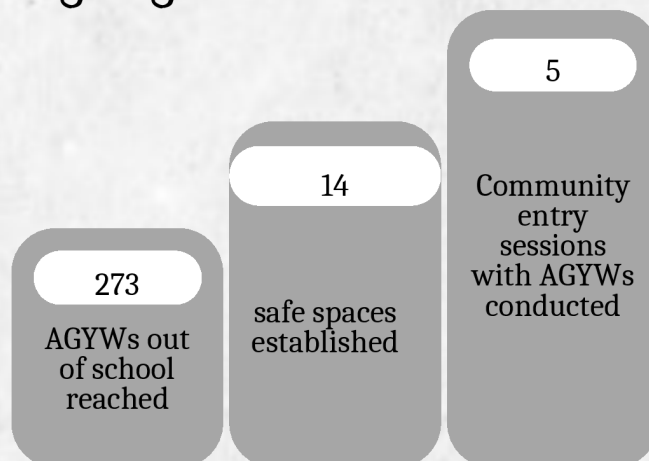
# She Deserves Her Rights and Skills Project



This project aims at increasing adolescent girls and young women's knowledge of SRHR and related life skills to prevent gender-based violence against women and girls. In November 2023, we rolled out a mapping exercise to identify adolescent girls and young women out of school to be enrolled in the project in Rangala and Simenya sub-locations in Sidindi ward, Ugunja, Asayi and Sirembe Sub-locations in North West Gem in Gem Sub-county and Umala, Nyalgunga and Nyamila in North Alego in Alego Usonga. A total of 273 adolescent girls and young women were reached as beneficiaries of the project. Community entry sessions were conducted with the listed AGYWs in the project to provide them with the information about the project and clarify their roles in the project. 14 safe spaces were established in all the project implementation areas as spaces of engagement and conversations between the adolescent girls and young women including sharing of experiences and supporting one another. Through awareness sessions and economic empowerment initiatives, the safe spaces

served to break the circle of violence and foster a culture of resilience among the AGYWs. The safe spaces were also utilized as community SRHR academies for strengthening the capacity of the AGYWs with SRHR information to increase their knowledge and awareness on SRHR.

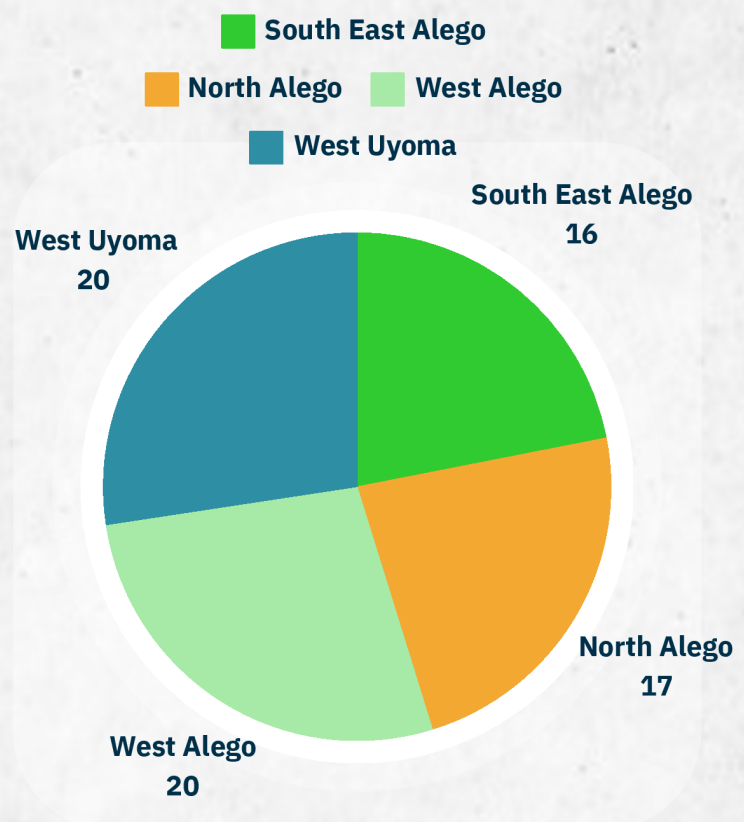


# Rebuilding widows hope for decent employment in Siaya



The project targets young widows in Alego Usonga and Rarieda sub-counties with the aim of strengthening their bargaining power to be able to challenge existing inequalities and human rights violations that they undergo in the community. The project provides them with the opportunity to understand their rights, mechanisms to address rights violations and explore opportunities for economic empowerment and income generation to support their households. In June 2023, we rolled out the project in North Alego, West Alego and South East Alego in Alego Usonga sub-county and West Uyoma in Rarieda Sub-county and enrolled 73 widows below 40 years, as beneficiaries of the project interventions in the subsequent year.

## SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS

### Enhanced Participation of Women in Decision-Making

- Promoted the full and effective participation of women at all levels, including decision-making processes, by advocating for their inclusion in leadership and governance structures. This has contributed to breaking structural barriers that often limit women's voices in public and community matters.

### Amplified Advocacy for Transparent Governance

- Strengthened governance and budget accountability through continuous advocacy for openness and transparency in the utilization of public resources. This effort has ensured more efficient and equitable service delivery, particularly benefiting marginalized communities and promoting respect for human rights within governance structures.

### Empowerment of Adolescent Girls and Young Women (AGYW) with Disabilities

- Empowered AGYW with disabilities by creating inclusive safe spaces and offering mentorship programs that provided information on sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) and economic empowerment. These efforts reduced vulnerabilities and enhanced the autonomy of young women with disabilities.

### Gender-Responsive Policy Advocacy in SRHR

- Advanced gender-responsive policies through targeted advocacy and community engagement, significantly enhancing the reach and impact of SRHR initiatives. Through forming safe spaces for teenage mothers and facilitating dialogue with policymakers, the organization has supported a healthier, more empowered future for young women.

### **Strengthened Women's Voices in Climate Action**

- Amplified the voices of women and youth in climate change response initiatives, actively advocating for gender inclusion in climate action policies. By participating in national and international platforms like the African Climate Summit and COP 28, the organization has positioned women at the forefront of climate justice conversations.

### **Empowerment of Young Widows through Economic Initiatives**

- Enhanced the economic empowerment of young widows by providing them with the necessary skills and tools to challenge inequalities and human rights violations. Through tailored training and support, these women have gained the confidence to advocate for their rights, contributing to their socio-economic resilience.

### **Institutional Growth and Strengthened Partnerships**

- Bolstered institutional capacity by expanding partnerships, networks, and financial resources. The organization has grown through strategic collaborations at both local and international levels, strengthening its ability to implement impactful programs and advocate for gender equality, SRHR, and climate justice.

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## **WHAT KEPT US AWAKE IN 2023 (CHALLENGES AND EMERGING ISSUES)**

- 1** Shrinking resource envelope – the organization has not been able to scale up its interventions due to limited resources
- 2** Shrinking civic space impacting on our civic organizing work.
- 3** Limitation of community structures in some project areas to facilitate timely GBV reporting and referral hindering access to justice and psychosocial support for the GBV survivors.
- 4** Loopholes in the county feedback mechanisms; the delay in providing information or withholding and concealing of some vital information by duty bearers
- 5** Civic awareness and engagement for the youth in Siaya is still a journey that calls for stronger collaborations, commitment and concerted efforts by the youth led and youth serving CSO's to bridge the gap.

# CHANGE STORIES

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## Woman sparking change in her village.

The dominance of patriarchy in Siaya County still manifests itself at large. Majority of women continue to experience exclusion in decision making and economic activity. Monica Okumu from Barding village in South East ward Siaya County is among women who have been sidelined for a longer period of time. She is among women who have been hit hard by the impacts of climate change. However, she had no idea that it is the responsibility of the County Governments to implement climate change interventions that cushion communities from the impacts of climate change. For her, she had never imagined of sitting in any community forum to discuss issues of climate change or engage with the local leaders to influence programs that can benefit her and other women in her community. To her, this was a men's agenda and probably women who are well educated. Monica's Maendeleo Women group, is among the women groups profiled by Siaya Muungano Network. Monica as the leader of the group, was taken through various training and capacity strengthening sessions which have equipped her with knowledge and skills to effectively participate and engage with leaders at the local level. Further, through the civic engagement sessions, she was able to understand the importance of women being at the center of climate action. Monica is currently organizing and mobilizing women at her community to participate in community forums and voice their concerns to their leaders and also hold their leaders accountable. She also holds meetings in her village to sensitize the members on climate change issues and sustainable environmental

conservation. She has supported the formation of a women accountability cell at her village to hold their leaders accountable on gender responsive climate change projects. She leads in following up with leaders to ensure they are accountable to their needs as women of Bar Agulu in Barding. "Sahi, tuko na sauti, tunaweza ongea na tusikike ingawa bado hatuja sikizwa sana lakini tunaungana na kuenda kwa public participation na tunaongea na sauti bila kuogopa na pia tuna follow up kwa vitu wamesema," says Monica loosely translated to 'right now we have the power to speak although we still have a long way to go. We can unite and attend public participation and raise our issues without fear. We also follow up with our leaders.'

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## Opportunities beyond borders

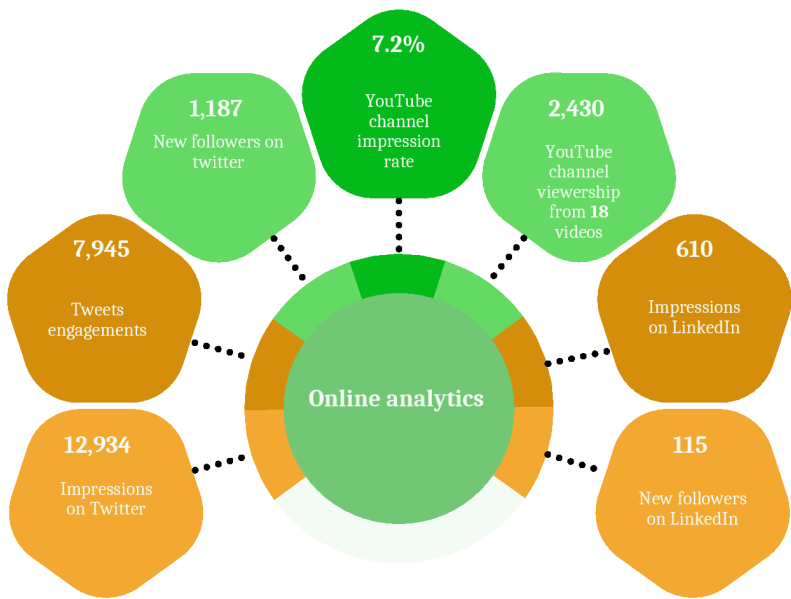


Since 2022, Chanukeni Youth Group has been engaged in sustained civic education, Sexual reproductive health and rights advocacy as well as sharing and linkage to opportunities for capacity strengthening. With a diverse group of youth with some having dropped out of school due to economic



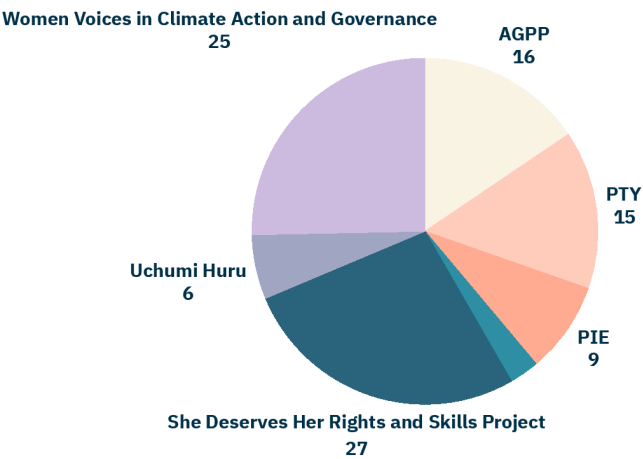
factors, access to employment has not been easy. It is therefore in this line that the group members resolved that there is a need for them to start a savings scheme to enable them sustain and empower themselves. With support from Power to Youth Project Community mobilizers who have continuously engaged the group through civic education, provided linkage and referral for them in different spaces and opportunities enabling the group to grow its savings and members are able to access loans under low interest rates which has enabled them sustain themselves. Recently when an opportunity to refer a group for support came up, we did not hesitate to mention Chanukeni Youth Group which has currently received capacity strengthening and mentorship on bee keeping with an additional 6 bee hives. In addition, the group was able to receive a grant of Kshs 70,000 from Villanova University after recommendation from Siaya Muungano Network. “Since we began engaging with Siaya Muungano Network, we have had access to several opportunities of learning that have transformed my outlook of the governance process, in addition i am now able to sustain myself with my kid unlike in the past when i had to put up with violence just for my needs to be met, said Sharon Tago a member of the group.
